Purpose - The Print Disability Services Program (the Program) supports organisations to produce print material in alternative formats for people with print disability who are unable to read standard print with ease due to vision impairment, a physical disability or a learning disability.

Overview - The Department of Social Services administers the Print Disability Services Program (the Program), which falls under Outcome 3: Disability and Carers – Program 3.1: Disability, Mental Health and Carers, Disability and Carer Service Improvement and Sector Support Program, of the Department of Social Services Portfolio Budget Statement.

The Print Disability Services Program (the Program) will run over three years from 2018-19 to 2020-21.

The Australian Government has committed a total of \$5,703,000 (GST exclusive) over three years (\$1,901,000 per year) for the Print Disability Services Program starting 1 July 2018. There is no maximum amount that may be applied for, however, grants cannot exceed \$5,703,000 (GST exclusive) for three years, which is the total available.

Funding under the Program is directed to the production of digital masters of print material, to reflect the uptake of recent and emerging technology and to ensure the best quality material is available to the end user. The availability of this material may be provided directly through the organisations selected to provide the output in the variety of appropriate print disability accessible formats or via another eligible organisation that provide the materials to the consuming print disability individual.

A person experiencing a print disability is typically denied a broad range of information that the majority of Australians take for granted. The primary outcome of the Print Disability Services Program is to ensure that those with a print disability have equal access to information.

The reasons for print disability vary but may include:

- vision impairment or blindness
- physical dexterity problems such as multiple sclerosis, Parkinson's disease, arthritis or paralysis
- learning disability, such as dyslexia
- brain injury or cognitive impairment
- literacy difficulties
- early dementia

The objectives of the Program are to:



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- Provide accessible information and materials that will assist people with a print disability to live independently, participate in education, gain employment and be active participants in their local community
- produce digital masters that can be converted to any of the following mediums: Braille, Audio, Large Print, Tactical Graphics, E Text (down-loadable format), Easy English, Accessible PDF, DAISY and MP3
- facilitate the registration of digital masters created on Trove - the online library database aggregator hosted by the National Library of Australia, and
- facilitate the registration of materials created on Trove.

Limitations - To be eligible you must:

- be one of the following entity types: ◦ a consortium with a lead organisation*
 - a partnership of eligible entities
 - an Australian private company
 - an Australian public company
 - an incorporated trustee on behalf of a trust
 - an incorporated association
 - an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander Corporation registered under the Corporations (Aboriginal and /or Torres Strait Islander) Act 2006
- have an Australian Business Number (ABN)
- be registered for the purposes of GST
- be a permanent resident of Australia
- have an account with an Australian financial institution
- be located in an Australian State or Territory.

Applications from consortia delivery models are acceptable, provided you have a lead applicant who is the main driver of the project and is eligible as per the list above.

*The Australian Government recognises that some organisations may seek to form Consortia in order to apply for a grant under the Program. Consortia are eligible to apply and the relevant conditions applicable to consortia are at 6.3 'Grant Applications from Consortia

What can the grant money be used for?

Primarily, the grant money is to be used for the following activities: •

- production of digital masters
- conversion from digital masters to: Braille, Audio, Large Print, Tactical Graphics, E Text, Easy English, Accessible PDF, DAISY and MP3 and any other disability appropriate assistance technology formats, and
- promotion of product availability

You can only spend grant funds on eligible grant activities as defined in the grant details in your grant agreement.

What the grant money cannot be used for?

You cannot use the grant for the following activities:

- purchase of land
- wages



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- major capital expenditure
- the covering of retrospective costs
- costs incurred in the preparation of a grant application or related documentation
- subsidy of general ongoing administration of an organisation such as electricity, phone and rent
- major construction/capital works
- overseas travel
- activities for which other Commonwealth, State, Territory or Local Government bodies have primary responsibility
- your own newsletters or enews letters for client cohorts
- supply of materials that would be normally be covered by your organisation as part of your core business
- supply of materials that would normally be covered by other programs and Government Departments – example: basic educational texts.

If you are successful, you will need to make sure that the staff working on the grant activity maintain the following registration:

- Working with Vulnerable People registration

Your organisation must maintain the following:

- a proven track record and capability in providing quality material in the variety of formats required by people with a print disability to suit individual requirements
- a credible record of good governance and efficient delivery of relevant products
- the ability to work collaboratively with other organisations
- ability to work with Department of Social Services to maximise outcomes and effectively manage, deliver and report on the project.

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Boosting Dementia Research Grants

Funding Providers - National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC)

Location - Aus

Funding Type - Grant G07704

Primary Category - Research

Eligible to – Universities, Not-for-Profits

Funding - Amount: \$0 to undisclosed, Total pool: \$18,000,000

Round - Closes 08-Nov-2017

Purpose - The Boosting Dementia Research Grants Scheme will provide financial support to approved Administering Institutions to administer on behalf of individual researchers and/or teams of researchers to undertake research and implementation projects in identified priority areas that will deliver on the NNIDR's policy objectives.

Overview - Up to \$18 million will be provided by NHMRC to support a National Dementia Network via PR3. Funding is available over five years.

Applicants are encouraged to identify further funding sources in support of their application. This could include the pharmaceutical industry, philanthropy, state and territory governments and host institutions.

There should be no expectation of future support from NHMRC beyond the five year duration of PR3 and applications should demonstrate a long term plan for sustainability of the Network.

Flowing from the registry, the Network is expected to deliver the following outcomes:

- 1.report on the natural history, disease trajectory and outcomes of dementia and cognitive impairment in accordance with the Framework for Australian clinical quality registries developed by the Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Health Care
- 2.establish suitable cohorts of highly characterised individuals as part of the registry who could participate in targeted and relevant clinical trials, and
- 3.develop a network of trial sites, which can be used for clinical dementia trials.

To achieve the intended outcomes, the Network will need to be an effective collaboration of dementia researchers as well as experts in clinical quality improvement, epidemiology, biostatistics, clinical data management, bioethics, privacy law and research governance. To ensure adequate recruitment to the registry the Network will need to engage appropriately with primary care and clinician practitioner groups, memory clinics, hospitals, service providers and consumer groups.

The specific objectives of the Boosting Dementia Research Grants Scheme are to support research that will provide a platform for strategically expanding dementia research in Australia, in priority areas.

Projects could include:

- supporting Australian participation in leading edge international dementia research collaborations and networks through joint funding ventures



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- filling priority knowledge gaps in dementia research and translation
- coordinating large scale cohort studies and analytical epidemiological studies, including phenotype and genotype characterisations
- funding essential research facilities, including brain imaging, biobanks, networks and data linkage studies
- providing a focal point for patient recruitment into preclinical and clinical trials, and
- driving the translation of research into tangible outcomes across primary and secondary prevention, treatment and care in the community, aged care and end of life stages for people with dementia and carers.

Limitations - Institutions must be an NHMRC approved Administering Institution to be eligible to receive and administer NHMRC funding - refer to the NHMRC website for a list of approved Administering Institutions.

PR3 will not fund:

- Applications that request funds for intervention trials or discovery research
- Applications that do not have an adequate plan for sustainability of the Network and of outcomes arising from the Network beyond the funding period provided through PR3.

Supporting People with Cancer Grant

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Purpose - The Supporting people with cancer Grant initiative aims to reduce the burden of cancer through the provision of grants to community organisations; and encourage effective partnerships between organisations in order to improve coordination, accessibility and development of quality cancer support networks to better support people affected by cancer.

Overview - The grant program aims to reduce the burden of cancer through the provision of grants to community organisations, and encourage effective partnerships between organisations in order to:

- improve the coordination, accessibility and development of quality cancer support networks
- better support people affected by cancer
- focus on local community needs
- develop innovative approaches to support options
- build community capability and demonstrate an impact at the health system, community and consumer level
- initiate visible partnerships and linkages to services which will foster appropriate referral to information and support

The Grant will comprise of:

- Grant up to \$120,000 over three years (2018-2021)

Organisations/consortia will contribute:

- Up to \$120,000 over three years (2018-2021).

Increasingly, people affected by cancer and the broader community are seeking to be active participants in decision making about their health. The community requires access to appropriate and evidence-based information that supports informed decision making about cancer risks, prevention and screening, as well as active involvement of people affected by cancer in decisions about all aspects of their care. The Grant approach includes coordinated and strengthened community networks, both locally and nationally, to be robust, reliable and sustainable, and to provide quality support to help people with poorer outcomes.

Funding will be made available through a competitive application round in late 2017, with announcement of successful applicants and funding in 2018. Funding will not exceed \$120,000 for any three-year grant and organisations will be required to contribute funding towards the objectives.

Applications must be submitted via email to: applications@canceraustralia.gov.au by 16 November 2017.

Priority - The areas of priority for applicants to target have been strengthened and aligned to Cancer Australia's Strategic Plan 2014-2019. This Framework consists of two categories.

Applicants are required to prepare a project proposal against one of the two categories below and must clearly demonstrate how their proposed project will address one or more of the priority target areas within the chosen category.



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- Category one: improving outcomes for people whose outcomes are poor and demonstrating impact at a health systems level and/or community systems level:
 - People whose outcomes are poorer
 - Regional and rural areas
- Category two: improving support, consumer involvement and evidence-based information at a local level:
 - Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples
 - People from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds
 - People from low socioeconomic status areas.

Limitations - Who can apply? Organisations must ensure that they are eligible to enter into a funding agreement with Cancer Australia before submitting their application. This means that organisations must be legal entities in their own right e.g. charitable organisations, community organisations, non-government and government organisations.

Individuals are not eligible to apply for this funding.

Organisations that can demonstrate existing or new partnerships are encouraged to apply to strengthen the availability and visibility of consumer information and cancer support networks. Consortia wishing to apply must identify a lead organisation.

Purpose - The mission of the Charity Brunch is to support rural communities with infrastructure to better the overall emotional, health and general well-being needs of the community.

Overview - Established in 2009, the Charity Brunch is an annual fundraiser held during the Sydney Royal Easter Show. Traditionally a ladies-only event, funds raised at the Brunch (to a maximum of \$20,000) go toward a carefully chosen grass roots project in country NSW that will have a positive social and economic impact on the broader community around it.

The vision of the Charity Brunch is to create holistically healthy regional communities so that NSW's agriculture industry can thrive.

To date, the Charity Brunch has raised over \$189,600, with proceeds going to support communities in Baradine, Inverell, Young, Bobadah, Condobolin, Binalong, Kempsey and Armidale with a variety of infrastructure and education needs.

Preference will be given to applications that address one or more crucial area identified by the Charity Brunch Committee:

- Civic Infrastructure - A way in which a region or community comes together and holds itself accountable for implementing its own cradle-to-career vision, and organises itself to identify what gets results for children; improves and builds upon those efforts over time, and invests the community's resources differently to increase impact.
- Family Resilience - A project that will promote healthy coping in families, assist families to be resilient in the face of change, and able to adapt in the face of crises.



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- Multicultural Diversity - Projects that demonstrate a multi-faceted partnership, wide community support and involvement of a range of community groups/representatives.
- Youth and Education - Projects that enrich the limited curricula that rural schools can offer.
- Primary Production Projects that support and educate the benefits of primary production for the local community.
- Health and Wellbeing - Projects that establish positive health, social behaviours and outcomes for the benefit of the local community.

The Charity Brunch Committee seeks projects that can articulate an emotive reason for their importance to their country NSW area and how great the impact will be. Projects need to have a broad reach within their community and preference is for 'place' based projects rather than regional or state based initiatives.

Limitations - Eligibility

To be eligible for funding, projects must:

- Align with the vision and mission of the Charity Brunch
- Be for initiatives or infrastructure which provides on-going benefit to the wider community
- Make a positive difference to social and/or community welfare, or assist in economic, environmental, health, education or cultural development.
- Be located in rural, regional and remote NSW (aligning with RAS Membership zones)

Applications will only be considered from independent organisations, funding will not be provided to an individual. Your organisation may be considered ineligible if you have previously been a recipient of funds from the Charity Brunch Committee or received a grant/benefit from the Royal Agricultural Society of NSW Foundation. This grant will not consider projects commercial in nature, operating costs, overheads or salary costs.

Purpose - The NAB Foundation is able to support a wide range of social purpose organisations. We can grant to charities and social enterprises as long as the program, project, initiative, or organisation that is applying for a grant has a charitable purpose and is aligned to our grant category.

Overview - We're pleased to announce that we have opened the environmental wellbeing grant round for the NAB Foundation's 2017 Grants Program.

The Sustainable Regions Grants from the NAB Foundation support the development and implementation of regional approaches to:

- strengthen co-ordination and collaboration between environmental groups, business, landholders and government,
- involve the community in practical on-ground action to improve the environment, and
- implement regional solutions to environmental challenges.

There are two grant types on offer within this category:

1. Thrive Grant: Thrive grants help initiatives or organisations to become sustainable, scale or collaborate and move to their next stage of growth,
2. Seed Grant: Seed grants build, test or pilot innovative ideas or help organisations get started through core operations and capacity building.

Grant amounts will start from \$100,000 to \$1,000,000 payable over a maximum period of up to three years.

The NAB Foundation is able to support a wide range of social purpose organisations. We can grant to charities and social enterprises as long as the program, project, initiative, or organisation that is applying for a grant has a charitable purpose and is aligned to our grant category.

Example -

Examples of the types of initiatives that may be eligible for the NAB Foundation Sustainable Regions Grants include but are not limited to those that address:

- Water quality: by increasing gully and stream bank control, improving fertiliser application efficiency, reducing erosion losses and improving farm water efficiency or minimising farm run-off,
- Climate change: by undertaking climate adaptation or carbon sequestration projects, implementing traditional firestick farming practices and other activities which reduce carbon emissions or mitigate climate risk, and



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- Biodiversity enhancement: by delivering re-vegetation or restoration of ecosystems such as coastal habitats, wetlands and riparian vegetation and enhancement of pollination or pest control services.

Limitations - Applicants must meet all eligibility criteria to proceed with the application.

- Registered as a charity with the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission (ACNC), or if not registered with the ACNC, your social enterprise, program or initiative has a charitable purpose that you can demonstrate is aligned to our grant category.
- If your organisation is not registered with the ACNC, your constitution or governing rules must contain charitable object(s).
- Has an ABN (Australian Business Number) and is incorporated, unless applying for a Seed Grant.
- Applies to the Seed Grant only - if you are not yet incorporated or registered with the ACNC and are applying for the Seed Grant, we will seek further information from you.
- Operates in Australia and will use the grant for the benefit of Australia communities.
- Prepared to sign and comply with the terms of the NAB Foundation Grant Agreement. If you require any of the terms to be modified, we will ask you to explain this in your application.
- Understand that the NAB Foundation reserves the right to accept or reject any applications in its sole discretion.

In addition:

- You must be able to clearly describe the charitable purpose of your organisation and program or initiative and demonstrate how the funds will only be used for this purpose.
- You must be able to demonstrate why your approach strengthens the region.
- You must be able to articulate why and how your activities will deliver their targeted outcome and how they will be measured. Please also refer to our FAQs, Eligibility Criteria and Application Guide available on our website for more details.

Purpose - Through the Community Health Promotion Grants Program, community organisations are funded to increase awareness of continence issues and where to seek help for members in their catchment areas.

Overview - Funding is available for community organisations to run bladder and bowel health promotion activities and events in their local community.

Community organisations can apply for up to \$1,500 (excl. GST) under this one-off grants program.

Grants for 2017-18 are now available. The closing date for applications is Monday 20 November 2017. However, applications will be assessed as soon as they are received, allowing successful applicants to run their events from October 2017 to April 2018.

Limitations -

Who is eligible?

Australian-based organisations with a focus on community support and/or health are eligible to apply ONLY IF they are incorporated or are a registered business with limited liability. Organisations can be local or state government funded, or privately funded.

Individuals, unincorporated or unregistered organisations/businesses are NOT eligible for this grant program.

Please note that state based continence resource centres are also NOT eligible for funding in this grant program.

What is eligible for funding?

- Bladder and bowel health promotion activities/events that aim to increase awareness of continence issues and where to seek help



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- Activities/events that primarily seek to benefit community members within the catchment area of the community health organisation
- Activity/event must be well planned and achievable within the proposed timeframe
- One-off activities/events that do not require recurrent or ongoing funding
- Funding for the specific activity/event listed in the application must be fully expended during the proposed funding period
- Activity/event organiser obtains all written approvals, consent and permits from the relevant authorities and/or stakeholders prior to commencing.

What is not eligible for funding?

- Activities/events: ◦that will be conducted outside of the catchment area of the community health organisation
 - requesting funding for wages/salaries for staff not directly engaged in the delivery of the activity/event
 - requesting retrospective funding for monies that have already been spent or monies to cover shortfalls in the operational budget
 - that are primarily for the purpose of fundraising
 - that are scheduled to occur before the Continence Foundation have made a final decision on the grant round

- Recurrent activities/events
 - General operating expenses
 - Incomplete or late applications.

Purpose - The NSW Government is offering a total of 25 scholarships for young regional artists and cultural workers to undertake exciting and career-making professional development opportunities.

Overview - Scholarships are open to artists, performers and arts and cultural workers from all art forms, including dance, design, digital arts, history, Aboriginal arts, literature, music, theatre, screen, curatorial and the visual arts.

Scholarships are worth \$10,000. Please do not request more or less than this amount in your application.

There are two rounds per year:

1. Round 1: Activities starting after 1 October 2017
2. Round 2: Activities starting after 1 March 2018

Your activities must start within six months of receiving the Scholarship, and be completed within 18 months.

Your professional development as an artist or arts/cultural worker may include multiple activities.

The Scholarship may be used to pay for:

- mentorships, internships or work experience with recognised professional practitioners or organisations
- residencies at institutions or organisations
- an outstanding opportunity of significance to the applicant's practice
- short-term courses, workshops or other training at recognised institutions or organisations
- periods of research and development
- skills development and experimentation
- development of new work
- international and/or national travel associated with these activities
- marketing, planning, publishing or printing
- materials and equipment relating to your professional development.

Additional opportunity: NSW State Cultural Institutions, State Significant Organisations and Key Festivals are willing to discuss opportunities to explore professional development activities, such as access to collections, residencies, mentorships or internships. You are encouraged to include details of any partnership or activities in your application.

Limitations -

Who can apply?

Scholarships are open to artists, performers and arts/cultural workers from all art forms, including dance, design, digital arts, history, Aboriginal arts, literature, music, theatre, screen, curatorial and the visual arts.

Special eligibility:

To be eligible to apply, you must:

- be aged 18–25 on the eligible start date of the program be a resident of regional NSW (this is defined as being resident for at least 12 months prior to making an application).



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University students studying in Sydney with a home address in regional NSW are also eligible to apply on the basis that they provide evidence of their home address as support material.

Previous recipients of this Scholarship and previous recipients of other Arts NSW/Create NSW grants who have not fulfilled the condition of their funding are not eligible to apply

Funding restrictions:

Funding is not available for:

- costs associated with a program that has already been substantially completed
- assisting with study for a tertiary education qualification

Limitations - Any Australian individual, partnership, company, association, co-operative, statutory corporation or trust that has carried on export promotion activities during the year for which they wish to apply for an export grant.

To be eligible, the business must have:

- income of not more than \$50 million in the grant year
- incurred at least \$15,000 of eligible export expenses under the scheme (first-time applicants can combine two years expenses)
- principal status for the export business (some exceptions apply, eg. non-profit export focused industry bodies)

The business also must have promoted one of the following:

- the export of goods and most services to residents of other countries

- inbound tourism
- the export of intellectual property and know-how
- conferences and events held in Australia

Under Austrade's Export Market Development Grants (EMDG) scheme, certain organisations and groups, who would not otherwise be eligible to apply for a grant under the general provisions of the EMDG Act can obtain approved status to enable them to apply for a grant in their own right. Purpose - To provide local councils and community organisations with funding to boost efforts to address crime and anti-social behaviour and protect organisations that may be facing security risks associated with racial or religious intolerance.

Overview - The Safer Communities Fund provides grants of up to \$1 million to community organisations and local governments for local crime prevention and security infrastructure activities and to protect community organisations that may be facing security risks associated with racial and /or religious intolerance.

Project activities can include:

- installation of fixed or mobile CCTV cameras
- installation of security lighting
- installation of bollards
- crime prevention through environmental design (CPTED) including the removal of environmental characteristics, such as a lack of lighting or poor natural surveillance, that can facilitate street crime and violence.

Grants of up to \$1 million will be available to fund up to 100 per cent of eligible project costs.

Projects must be completed by 30 June 2020.

Limitations -

Eligibility:



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To be eligible you must:

- have an Australian Business Number (ABN)

and be one of the following entities:

- an entity incorporated in Australia
- an incorporated not for profit organisation
- a local government agency or body
- an Australian state or territory government entity.

If your organisation is an unincorporated entity or does not have an ABN you can either:

- become an incorporated entity and obtain an ABN; or
- partner with an entity that is eligible as outlined above, to undertake the project.

You are not eligible to apply if you are:

- a government or non-government school or preschool that is registered as an educational establishment with a state or territory registration authority.

Additional eligibility requirements:

In order to be eligible you must provide:

- evidence that you have authority to undertake the project at the nominated site. You must provide this evidence in the application form or prior to entering into a grant agreement.
- a detailed project budget and evidence to support the project costs in the application form. You must attach a minimum of one current quote for individual items up to \$50,000 and a minimum of two quotes for items exceeding \$50,000 showing equipment and installation costs. Quotes must be obtained and dated within 2 months of application lodgement. Alternatively, you must attach a justification of costs as outlined in your tender documentation.

Eligible projects:

To be eligible your project must include eligible activities and eligible expenditure.

We cannot fund your project if it receives funding from another local, state, territory or Commonwealth government grant. You can apply for a grant for your project under more than one government programme, but if your application is successful, you must choose either the Safer Communities Fund grant or the other government grant.

Eligible activities:

Eligible activities must directly relate to the project and can comprise the following local crime prevention and security infrastructure activities:

- installation of fixed or mobile CCTV cameras
- installation of security lighting installation of bollards
- crime prevention through environmental design (CPTED) including the removal of environmental characteristics, such as a lack of lighting or poor natural surveillance, that can facilitate street crime and violence.

CPTED seeks to reduce the opportunities for crime through the design and management of the built and landscaped environment. Strategies include modifying the built environment to create safer



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places that are less crime-prone or can make people feel safer. For example, incorporating design features in public spaces that encourage large numbers of users and provide greater natural surveillance, or incorporating additional lighting in public spaces so that they do not create places for potential offenders to hide. The National Crime Prevention Framework provides further information about CPTED principles and is available at http://www.aic.gov.au/crime_community/crimeprevention/ncpf.html.

Eligible Expenditure:

You can only spend grant funds on eligible expenditure you have incurred on an agreed project as defined in your grant agreement. Eligible expenditure items can include:

- the cost of purchase and installation of:
 - fixed or mobile CCTV cameras
 - security lighting
 - bollards
- costs associated with crime prevention through environmental design
- the cost of an independent audit of project expenditure (where we request one) up to a maximum of 1 per cent of total eligible project expenditure.

The Programme Delegate makes the final decision on what is eligible expenditure and may give additional guidance on eligible expenditure if required.

To be eligible, expenditure must:

- be a direct cost of the project
- be incurred by you for approved project audit activities.

You must not start your project until your grant agreement is executed.

You must incur the project expenditure between the project start and end date as specified in your grant agreement for it to be eligible unless stated otherwise.

Ineligible expenditure:

Expenditure items that are not eligible include:

- an organisation's operation or running costs
- any in-kind contributions
- activities, equipment or supplies that are already being supported through other sources
- costs incurred prior to a grant agreement being executed.
- financial costs, including interest and debt financing
- costs related to preparing the grant application
- maintenance of equipment or infrastructure contingency funds
- travel to conferences, fund raising or sponsorships
- large-scale capital equipment and capital works, including the purchase or lease of land and/or purchase, construction or maintenance of buildings and vehicles.

This list is not exhaustive and applies only to the expenditure of the grant funds. Other costs may be ineligible where we decide that they do not directly support the achievement of the planned outcomes for the project or that they are contrary to the objective of the programme. We may



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update the guidelines on eligible expenditure. If your application is successful, the version in place when you submitted your application applies to your project.
