Our new Mayor and Councillors

Upper Lachlan Shire Council has a new-look Council team, with five Councillors re-elected and four newly-elected at the Council Elections, held on 10 September 2016.

The incoming councillors included:

- Brian McCormack (re-elected)
- Pam Kensit (newly elected)
- John Searl (re-elected)
- Ron Cummins (newly elected)
- Richard Opie (newly elected)
- James Wheelwright (re-elected)
- Darren O'Brien (re-elected)
- John Stafford (newly elected)
- Paul Culhane (re-elected)

Their first order of business was an induction session held on 19 September 2016, where Council's General Manager John Bell discussed the role and expectations of Councillors, including the Code of Conduct and pecuniary interest requirements.

Council's Director of Environment and Planning Tina Dodson, Director of Works Phillip Newham and Director of Finance and Administration Andrew Croke also outlined the functions of their respective Departments.

The Councillors were officially sworn in at the ordinary Council meeting held in Crookwell on 22 September 2016, where the election of Mayor and Deputy Mayor also took place.

Cr Brian McCormack OAM was elected as Mayor and Cr John Stafford was elected Deputy by their fellow Councillors.

Cr McCormack was first elected to Crookwell Shire Council in 1987, and was elected Mayor

in 1999, a role he held until the 2004 local government amalgamations. He was appointed Administrator of the newly formed Upper Lachlan Shire Council in 2004 and served as Mayor from 2004 to 2007.

Cr Stafford was newly elected to Council on 10 September 2016.

Under recent amendments to the *Local Government Act 1993*, the term of office for Mayors elected by Councillors was increased from one to two years.

Councillors voted unanimously for the position of Deputy Mayor to be held for one year.

Mr Bell welcomed the new councillors to the role.

"On behalf of Council, I would like to congratulate the nine incoming councillors on their election and look forward to working collaboratively with them over the next four years," Mr Bell said.

"I would also like to extend my thanks to outgoing councillor Malcolm Barlow for his contribution to Council and the community during his time as a Councillor."

Have your say - Regional Community Strategic Plan

The Councils of Upper Lachlan, Goulburn Mulwaree and Yass Valley are working together to prepare a combined Regional Community Strategic Plan (CSP) to ensure the Region has a stronger voice in State Government decisions on regional planning and funding.

The aim of the draft Regional CSP is to provide clear strategic directions for the long term, and identify the main priorities and aspirations of the communities of the Region. It is envisaged that the draft Regional CSP will be based on the following five pillars of life in the Southern Tablelands, which includes:

- Community (Life and Welfare in the Community)
- Environment (Conditions and Influences in the Area and Sustainability)
- Economy (Generation, Distribution, Use of Income and Business Development)
- Infrastructure (Facilities, Transport and Systems Serving the Area)
- Civic Leadership (System of Government or Management)



Crookwell Pool repairs underway

The refurbishment of Crookwell Swimming Pool is underway, with work to be completed in time for summer (weather permitting).

Constructed in 1958, the 33m pool had started to crack and show signs of leaking.

Work will include resurfacing and repainting the pool's walls, to extend the life of the pool and reduce water use.

The upgrade has been jointly funded with \$30,000 from Council and \$15,000 under the Federal Government's Stronger Communities Program.

Mayor Cr Brian McCormack OAM



Cr McCormack has been active in Local Government for over 29 years.

He was first elected to Crookwell Shire Council in 1987 and held the position of Mayor from 1999-2004.

Upon the local government amalgamations in 2004 Cr McCormack was appointed as the Administrator of the newly formed Upper Lachlan Shire Council before being elected as Mayor that same year. He served as Mayor from 2004-2007 and was again elected Mayor on 22 September 2016.

Deputy Mayor Cr John Stafford



Cr Stafford was newly elected to Council on 10 September 2016.

He stood for election to contribute to an improved vision for the future development of the Shire.

His priorities over the next four years are to provide strategic vision for economic development, increase

tourism and increase residential development.

Cr Stafford was elected to the position of Deputy Mayor on 22 September 2016.

Cr Pam Kensit



Cr Kensit has been a resident of the Upper Lachlan Shire for 26 years.

She was newly elected to Council on 10 September 2016.

Her top three priorities on Council over the next four years is to deliver better consultation and

communication with the community and better care of our communities.

Cr John Searl JP



Cr Searl was first elected to Upper Lachlan Shire Council in 2012.

Over the next four years, Cr Culhane's top priorities are to support the continued upgrade of infrastructure across the Shire and support the Goulburn to Crookwell Rail Trail and other tourism initiatives.

He will also continue to push for a natural gas connection to the Shire.

Update: Crookwell Water Supply Upgrade

The tap has been turned on Crookwell's Water Supply Upgrade Project with construction going from a trickle to a flood last month.

The \$7 million Project, jointly funded by Upper Lachlan Shire Council and the NSW Government's Restart NSW Water Security for Regions Program, will provide Crookwell with a first class water supply system, ensuring superior drinking water quality, improved reliability in times of drought and increased capacity to support Crookwell's future growth.

The Project involves the construction of a new Water Treatment Plant adjacent to the Crookwell Dam on Waterworks Road.

Scheduled for completion in July 2017, the Plant will have the capacity to supply a minimum 4 million litres of drinking water to Crookwell each day – Crookwell's current highest usage is just 1 million litres per day.

The Plant will be based on the Dissolved Air Flotation and Filtration process and include chlorination and fluoridation. Design and construction of the Plant is being undertaken by Laurie Curran Water Pty Ltd, which also completed the Gunning Water Treatment Plant for Council in 2014.

The Project also includes extensive water main renewals throughout the town and the installation of improved watering systems for Council's sporting fields, with work to be undertaken by Council and interruptions to water to be kept to a minimum.

Devil's Elbow Realignment

Council has secured funding to straighten the notorious 'Devil's Elbow' corner on Grabben Gullen Road between Crookwell and Gunning.

Federal Member for Hume Angus Taylor announced last month that Council will receive a total of \$460,046 under the Australian Government's *Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity and Black Spot Project Programmes*.

Total cost of the project will be \$1,079,908, with \$540,000 funded under the NSW Government's Fixing Country Roads Programme and \$79,862 from Council. Construction will start in March 2017.

Healthy funding boost

Upper Lachlan Shire Council recently welcomed an announcement by the State Government that the Crookwell Neighbourhood Centre will receive \$50,000 under the Social Housing Community Improvement Fund for the purchase and maintenance of the Shire's first community outdoor gym.

Crookwell Neighbourhood Centre Community Hub Co-ordinator Linda Stephenson said the outdoor gym would give the social housing community access to a free recreation facility in Crookwell, which will encourage healthy lifestyles and allow for greater social interaction with the broader community.

"We are very thankful to the State Government for this funding and to Upper Lachlan Shire Council for their support, input and guidance in submitting our funding application – it was very much a joint effort," Mrs Stephenson said.

"When completed, the outdoor gym will accommodate all levels of fitness, including people with disability, and will be available to all members of the community."

Council's General Manager John Bell said the Council was very pleased to assist the Neighbourhood Centre with their funding application and looked forward to project managing the installation of the outdoor gym.

Main Street Upgrade Back on Track

Crookwell's main street upgrade is back on track, after persistent wet weather delayed the \$1 million project.

Upper Lachlan Shire Council General Manager John Bell said, weather permitting, asphalt work would take place from Sunday, 6 November 2016 until Saturday, 12 November 2016 between the hours of 7.00pm to 6.00am.

"Fortunately, the stage one work completed in April between Roberts Street and Laggan Road to address underlying failures in the road surface has remained intact, despite the wet weather," Mr Bell said.

"Council looks forward to seeing work start on stage two of the project. While we will aim to complete most of the work at night, there may be some inconvenience to motorists.

"On behalf of Council, I would ask for patience as our crews undertake this important work, which will not only improve safety by repairing defects, but also enhance the visual appeal of Goulburn Street."

The project is being undertaken by Upper Lachlan Shire Council on behalf of the Roads and Maritime Services (RMS) and is part of their State Pavement Rehabilitation Program.

The work is part of the contract that Council has with the RMS to undertake maintenance and reconstruction works on 110km of Main Road 54, stretching between Auburn St in Goulburn through to the Abercrombie Bridge.

Council budget in surplus

Council's 2015/16 Financial Statements were presented to the Council meeting held on Thursday, 20 October 2016.

These included the annual General Purpose Financial Statements, Special Purchase Financial Statements and Permissible General Income Statements.

Council's Director of Finance and Administration Andrew Croke said the net operating result from all Council activities in 2015/16 totalled a \$3.8 million surplus.

"All performance measures used by the Office of Local Government and the Fit for the Future Program indicate the Council is in a sound financial position to meet all provisions and liabilities," Mr Croke said.

The 2015/16 Financial Statements were audited by Intentus Chartered Accountants.

Wildlife and Weather Events

Wild, windy weather can bring down trees and nests and separate young and vulnerable chicks and joeys from their parents. Parent birds have very strong instincts to protect and feed their young. Wherever possible the best outcome for most birds is to reunite them. Often young birds will be found on the ground after falling from nests. It is normal for fledgling magpies to fall out of the nest and spend a couple of days on the ground, with parents feeding them whilst they master the tricky art of flying. However, wind and storms may bring many to the ground far too early, and they may need another couple of weeks to develop to full fledgling stage before they can fly.

If you find a chick on the ground, put it back in the nest if possible. If the nest is too high up to reach, you can put a post in the ground, and attach a basket to it as a "pretend nest", or secure a basket in the tree the chick came from. If you then move well away from the "nest", the parents may come back and start to feed their little one. This is always the best option as being raised by their parents gives chicks the best start to being wild birds. As carers, no matter how hard we try, we cannot raise them as well as their natural parents. It may take some time for the parents to return but if the chick is very young and there is no sign of the parents after a reasonable length of time, it will need to come into care.

As the weather warms up we receive many calls from people concerned because they see a snake on their property. Generally snakes are shy, reclusive animals and will avoid confrontation with humans at all costs,

preferring to flee if given the opportunity. WIRES' priority is to respond to situations where reptiles are injured. We are unable to respond to all the calls we receive where the snake is not injured or posing an immediate risk to human safety. Our advice if someone calls because they have seen a snake outside their home is that usually it will move on before very long. Snakes have no vested interest in attacking humans, and any bites are almost always a defensive response to a perceived threat. Given this fact, it is reasonable to assume that, if left alone, the risk posed by any Australian snake would be negligible.

While most native animals are well adapted to changes in climatic conditions they can still suffer during heatwaves. Animals can cope with extremes in temperatures they are used to, but if these extremes are unusual for a particular area the animals there will struggle. So, with summer approaching please put fresh, cool water out for wildlife. Make sure you have a few sticks or stones in bowls or containers so that if small creatures fall in they can make it back out. Refresh the water daily, and more often during periods of extreme heat. If you are on a rural property and are concerned about water bowls attracting snakes to the house, then place shallow bowls around the perimeter fences. This can also assist in providing a water source to deter reptiles from seeking water from sources closer to the house. Flying-foxes are particularly susceptible to several days with low humidity and very high temperatures. If you see flying-foxes, young or old, on the ground, or moving to lower branches or to the ground below their roost trees please call WIRES. It is important that only trained and vaccinated carers rescue distressed and injured flying-foxes or bats. Animals with health issues, or the very young or old, will find it harder to cope. The increasing loss of suitable habitat, including the loss of leafy vegetation and older growth trees with hollows for shelter, means more animals are at risk in the heat. Tree hollows are particularly essential for our native parrots and many of our marsupials. As less and less hollows are available for shelter it means more creatures

Weeds Update: Control Serrated Tussock Now

Serrated tussock remains the number one noxious weed issue affecting communities within Upper Lachlan Shire and Council's Noxious Weeds Manager, Paul Brown stresses that all landholders have a responsibility to control serrated tussock infestations on land that they are responsible for.

To be successful with control programs in our area all landowners need to survey their properties now for the presence of serrated tussock plants and take appropriate control action before the plants produce seed during November.

Mr Brown advises that on a high percentage of properties within Upper Lachlan controlling serrated tussock can be achieved by simply regularly patrolling paddocks and digging out or spot spraying invading scattered plants.

One of the major restraints in controlling serrated tussock remains to be the accurate identification of plants. It is particularly important that all landholders in our area have the ability and skills to identify plants and carry out effective control programs. Landholders requiring assistance in identification or implementing control programs can obtain information by contacting Council's Weed Officers.

Joseph Flood Memorial Unveiled

Former Upper Lachlan Shire Mayor John Shaw OAM, former Deputy Mayor James Wheelwright, General Manager John Bell, members of the Crookwell and District Historical Society and family members of the late Joseph Flood gathered at Diamond Road, Crookwell in August for the unveiling of a memorial plaque in his honour.

Mr Flood was working for Crookwell Council as a ganger in 1907 when he was tragically killed by a falling tree while felling trees on Diamond Road. He was just 50 years old and was survived by his wife Sarah Jane and their five children.

His obituary, published in the *Crookwell Gazette*, described Mr Flood as a "universal favourite...[without] an enemy in the world. He was an excellent citizen, a devoted husband, and an indulgent father."

Cr Shaw said Mr Flood's untimely death was a tragic moment in Crookwell's history.

"Mr Flood's death in 1907 had such an impact on the small, tight-knit Crookwell community at that time, that it is remembered to this day. It is only fitting that we have now have a memorial to honour Mr Flood and his legacy," Cr Shaw said.

The plaque was installed by Council at the request of the Crookwell and District Historical Society.

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Community groups ring in funding grants



Three Upper Lachlan Shire community groups have recently completed projects thanks to a funding boost from Southern Phone.

Members of the Collector and District Historical Association (pictured left) received \$4740, which assisted in the publication of the Collector History Walk Book. The Book provides a fascinating insight into Collector's history and contains a timeline which dates from 1820 when Governor Macquarie named the "Great Lake".

Crookwell Amateur Dramatic Society received a further \$6960 toward the installation of hot water and power in their men's dressing room and shelving for the storage of costumes and props. Flooring was also replaced in the backstage dressing rooms which has made the dressing rooms warmer and cleaner.

The Bigga Hall Committee received \$13,300 to assist in the upgrade to the Bigga Recreation Ground septic. The new Dump-Ezy station allows for easy unloading of wastes straight from RV's and caravans to the septic system.

Total cost of the 'Play and Stay' project will be about \$38,000, with Council funding the difference.

Council welcomes Disaster Relief Declaration

Upper Lachlan Shire Council General Manager John Bell said the declaration would allow Council, as well as impacted residents, small businesses and primary producers to apply for assistance under the joint Commonwealth-State Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements.

If approved, Council intends to use the funding to repair crossings washed out by flooded creeks and damaged roads, in consultation with NSW Roads and Maritime Services.
