Improvements to Pat Cullen Reserve opened

Mrs Tuckerman echoed Cr Stafford's sentiments at the official opening.

"Congratulations to the volunteers, committee and the Upper Lachlan Shire Council staff for the wonderful improvements at the Pat Cullen Reserve," she said.

"Significant works already undertaken by the Kiamma Creek Landcare Group to improve the reserve, and the injection of funds for a connecting bridge and pedestrian pathways from the NSW Government Stronger Country Communities Fund has certainly made this reserve a beautiful place to be!"

Kiamma Landcare Group representative Malcolm Barlow also thanked Gullen Range Wind Farm representative Simon Zhao for their grant funding for the entry walls and disability ramp that formed part of the improvements. The Official Opening of the Pat Cullen Reserve Community Recreation Area Project was compered by Cr Brian McCormack OAM and was accompanied by the Music in the Park event. Guests and performers included the Liverpool Brass Band, Lester Ives on Didgeridoo, Maggie Somerville, Maria K and Matt Ford, Australian Poetry compered by Laurie McDonald, John Brennan, Caroline Maxfield, Elaine Delaney and the Laggan Bush Poets and an open mic for performers and poets.

FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

The Upper Lachlan Shire Council recently commenced water restrictions in the township of Taralga. The decision was not taken lightly, and much

consideration was given to it.

As I write this, Taralga's water supply is at approximately 60%, and has reached that level two months earlier than it did last summer.

Initially Level 2 water restrictions have been implemented but these will be reassessed each week based on monitoring usage.

Obviously water restrictions cause disruption and can make life tougher for those affected, but the over-riding priority has to be the conservation of our water resources as we head into a summer in which little rainfall is forecast. Life would be much tougher if there is no water. Level 2 restrictions mean that you CAN use microsprays for 15 minutes and one hand held hose for up to an hour per day between 7:00am to 8:00am or 6:30pm to 7:30pm.

Prohibited under Level 2 Restrictions:

- sprinklers and fixed hoses cannot be used private swimming pools cannot be filled or
- topped up - cars cannot be washed by hose
- stock cannot be watered from the town water supply.

The important thing is that we use water wisely so that we don't run out... and this is true in areas that aren't under water restrictions as well.

With wide spread awareness of the ongoing drought, and indications that rain will be scarce in the immediate future, it is just common sense that we try and find ways to use less water.

Temporary bridge closures in the Upper Lachlan

Temporary Closure - Reids Flat Rd 2 Bridge Upper Lachlan Shire Council advises the Reids Flat Road will be temporarily closed until Friday 13 December 2019. For detailed program please visit Council's website.

Maps will be available on Council's website for alternate routes. Council have advised emergency services and have discussed alternate arrangements. A letter drop has been arranged to residents within the immediate vicinity of the bridge.

Upper Lachlan Shire Council advises the Jeffreys Road near Big Hill locality will be temporarily closed at the Jeffreys Road Bridge over Bridgy Creek until Thursday, 12 December 2019. For detailed program please visit Council's website.

The road will be temporarily closed to enable contractors to carry out the replacement of the bridge to allow load limit restrictions to be removed. Council's Acting General Manager Andrew Croke said traffic control will be in place and signposted to provide information about changed traffic conditions while the road remains closed. Council have advised emergency services. All affected property owners have been advised about the bridge closure and a letter drop has been arranged to residents within the immediate vicinity of the bridge.

"Motorists are asked to observe all signage and drive to conditions while the bridges ares closed for construction," Mr Croke said.

"Council apologises to the community for any inconvenience caused and the bridge replacement will be completed as expediently as possible"

Remembrance Day commemorations in Crookwell well attended

The Remembrance Day commemorations at Memorial Oval on November 11 were well attended as the district remembered those who have served and those who fell in the protection of their country.

An estimated 100 students joined with a similar number of adults to pay their respects to local men and women who risked, and in some cases gave their lives in armed conflicts.

The Commemorations were emceed by Crookwell RSL Sub-Branch Secretary, Bev Hatch. Other members of the official party were Reverend Wayne Landford, who led those present in prayer; Upper Lachlan Shire Councillor Pam Kensit, who read the poem "In Flanders Field"; and Crookwell RSL Sub-Branch President, Kevin King, who recited the Ode which was accompanied by the Last Post, a minute's silence, and the Rouse.

Understanding Q Fever - information sessions in February

Living in a rural community, it is important we are all aware of the bacterial infection called Q fever. For an unlucky few this infection can lead to a chronic-fatigue-like illness lasting for years.

Many people infected with Q fever have few or no symptoms, but those who do become sick often have a severe flu-like illness. Symptoms include;

- high fevers and chills
- · severe 'drenching' sweats
- · severe headaches, often behind the eyes
- muscle and joint pains

• extreme fatigue

Without treatment, symptoms can last from 2-6 weeks and patients will often require time off work, varying from a few days to several weeks.

Most people make a full recovery and become immune to repeat infections. However, about 10% of patients who are sick with acute Q fever go on to suffer from this debilitating illness for years.

People usually get infected by breathing in the Q fever bacteria that is in the air or dust. Cattle, sheep and goats are the main sources of infection, however a wide range of animals, domestic, feral and native can also spread the bacteria to humans.

Upper Lachlan included in Drought Communities Programme

The Upper Lachlan Shire Council has been included in the Federal Government's Drought Communities Programme.

Along with 127 other Councils, the Upper Lachlan Shire Council is eligible to apply for up to \$1 Million in funding for eligible projects.

Council understands that shovel-ready projects will require completion by 31 December 2020. Finalisation of the application process and guidelines are expected to be advised shortly.

The funding will target infrastructure and other projects that:

• Provide employment for people whose work opportunities have been impacted by drought

• Stimulate local government spending

- Use local resources, businesses and suppliers; and
- Provide a long-lasting benefit

to communities and the agricultural industries on which they depend.

Acting General Manager of Upper Lachlan Shire Council, Andrew Croke, welcomed the announcement that Upper Lachlan Shire Council had been added to the Drought Communities Programme.

"This will be of great assistance to our communities which are experiencing hardship in this prolonged drought," he said. "The intent of the funding is to not only provide an immediate economic stimulus, but to also assist in safeguarding against future periods of drought by constructing and repairing community infrastructure, facilities and spaces."

Upper Lachlan Shire Council is one of six Councils that were added to the initial programme on November 7.

Other previously-announced elements of the Government's \$709 Million drought relief package include loans of up to \$2 million for farmers, and interest free loans of up to \$500,000 for businesses that depend on agriculture can access. You can also get infected with Q fever by direct contact with infected animal tissue or fluids on broken skin.

If diagnosed early, treatment with antibiotics can get you better sooner and reduce your risk of long-term complications. However, vaccination is the best way to prevent Q fever infection. Vaccination is recommended for everyone aged 15 years and over who have the potential to be exposed to cattle, sheep, and goats.

Another precaution to help guard against Q fever and a variety of other potential infections that can be passed between animals and humans is to wash hands and arms thoroughly in soapy water after any contact with animals. And wear a properly fitted P2 mask (available from pharmacies and hardware stores) and gloves when handling or disposing of animal products.

Upper Lachlan Landcare will be hosting two Q fever information sessions in 2020; from 5 to 6pm on Wednesday 19th February in Gunning, and 5 to 6pm Thursday 20th February in Crookwell. For more information contact; Ruth Aveyard 0447 242 474 coordinator@upperlachlanlandcare.org.au.

Work starts on shower and toilet block at Crookwell Showground

Ground has been broken on the installation of a shower/toilet block in the Crookwell Showground.

The shower/toilet block, funded by Round 1 of the NSW Government's Stronger Country Communities Fund, is the final stage of the Crookwell Showground Upgrade which has included the installation of fencing around the rose garden and wood chop area and the completion of a new administration block. Serviced camp sites with water and electricity have also been undertaken with this funding.

Paul Anderson, president of the Crookwell Showground

Committee, has been front and centre, project managing the improvements.

"There is limited funding for projects like this in the Shire and we have been grateful to obtain state funding to upgrade the facilities at the Crookwell Showground," he said.

Upper Lachlan Shire Council performing favourably against rural councils of a similar size

Population, employment and income are among some of the key indicators demonstrating that Upper Lachlan Shire Council is performing favourably compared with rural councils of a similar size.

A recent Your Local Government publication, "Measuring Local Government Performance," published in September this year showed that Upper Lachlan Shire Council has experienced 4.8% population growth in the five year period to the 2017/2018 financial year, compared with an average population decrease of 0.2% across the group.

Upper Lachlan Shire Council is classified by the Office of Local Government as part of Group 10, covering rural councils with a population between 5,000 and 10,000.

The unemployment rate for Upper Lachlan Shire Council of 3% is almost half of the Group 10 average of 5.9%, while the average taxable income of \$49,730 is \$2,763 better than the group average of \$46,967.

Acting General Manager Andrew Croke described these figures as very encouraging.

"Council has solid population growth, minimal unemployment and strongly trending incomes," Mr Croke said.

"Upper Lachlan Shire Council is performing very strongly compared with the rest of the Local Government Group in many important measures.'

In other key indicators, Upper Lachlan Shire Council's average ordinary residential rates of \$490.87 compare favourably with the group average of \$644.45, as does the business rate (\$982.08 compared with \$1,485.10) and the farmland rate (\$1,749.64 compared with \$2,761.47).

The report also indicates that there are 1,161 active businesses in the Upper Lachlan Shire, significantly more than the Group 10 average of 842 per LGA.

Group 10 consists of the following Local Government areas: Berrigan, Bland, Blayney, Cobar, Cootamundra, Dungog, Forbes, Glenn Innes, Gloucester, Gwydir, Junee, Kyogle, Lachlan, Liverpool Plains, Murray, Narranderra, Narromine, Oberon, Snowy River, Temora, Tenterfield, Upper Lachlan, Uralla, Walgett, Wellington and Wentworth.
