Election Results

ON SATURDAY September 13, 2008, residents of the Upper Lachlan Shire elected nine Councillors to represent them at Council over the next four years.

Counting was completed on Monday September 15, with John Shaw and Brian McCormack elected without the need of preferences. They were followed by James Wheelwright, Michael Mayoh, Paul Culhane Sandra Bill, Brian Moloney, Michael Coley, and Malcolm Barlow.

The returning and new Councillors took their places at the Crookwell Council chambers on Thursday September 25. At this meeting returning Councillor, John Shaw, was elected as the Mayor for a

second term, while Cr James Wheelwright was returned as Deputy Mayor.

Mayor Shaw thanked the Councillors for choosing him as Mayor, saying he was humbled by the confidence shown by his fellow Councillors. Re-elected Mayor Shaw committed the Council to a continuation of the co-operative working arrangement that was so evident in the previous Council.

"The last Council, in my opinion, achieved the significant results it did because they worked so well together. There will be a number of challenges for this new Council that will demand a similar commitment. As Councillors we were elected to represent the best interest of the entire Shire and it is through co-operation that we, as Councillors,

must balance the needs of the different villages, towns and localities against our own voter base looking for the best results for the entire Shire.

"I wish to congratulate both the returning Councillors and the new faces. I look forward to working with you all during the upcoming years," Mayor Shaw said.

Mayor Shaw also announced that the new Council would set aside 30 minutes before the Council's normal meetings, Crookwell only, for members of the public to come and ask questions of himself or any Councillor available.

Cr Wheelwright, returning as Deputy Mayor, voiced his agreement with Mayor Shaw. "I wish to thank the voters of the Shire for my re-election and to the members of the Council for returning me as the Council's Deputy Mayor.


"There are indeed considerable hurdles ahead for this Council but I believe, like the Mayor, if this Council works closely together we can deliver the sound management the ratepayers of this Shire deserve," Deputy Mayor Wheelwright said.

Voters were also asked "Do you support the continuing development and construction of wind farm turbines in the Upper Lachlan Council area?"

The wind farm poll vote was 70.04% in favour and 29.96% against, with every polling booth registering a yes vote majority.

Country Energy investing in the Upper Lachlan





COUNTRY Energy is reminding energy customers across country and coastal New South Wales that the start of the severe thunderstorm season has arrived.

Storms, are more common than any other natural hazard, pose a danger to people and property including powerlines and electrical equipment.

With this in mind, Country Energy is

asking people to be prepared for storms, know what to do in a severe storm and to stay informed.

Country Energy's regional general manager south eastern, David Bellew said "Severe thunderstorms generally occur from September to March which is when we experience our highest incidence of unplanned electricity supply interruptions. "Almost a third of all unplanned supply interruptions on Country Energy's network are weather related — this includes lightning strikes and storm damage.

"This is also the time when we ask people to remain vigilant for fallen powerlines, damaged power poles and other electrical Country Energy encourages people to prepare for storm season by clearing yards of loose materials and rubbish and to check and secure tiles or roofing sheets that may blow loose and come in to contact with the power supply.

"We also ask that people assess the potential for trees or overhanging branches to come in to contact with powerlines and to contact a professional to have these trimmed," David said.

"Under no circumstances should people try to trim trees that are contacting our infrastructure or that are overhanging our poles and wires."

After a storm has rolled through an area, disrupting power, Country Energy asks

that customers contact them to inform them of any supply interruption.

"While we have sophisticated equipment that can tell us where a problem is, it's always helpful to have customers call in.

"We'll respond as quickly as we can, restoring power as fast as safety allows," David said. "We just ask that people be patient and keep post-storm safety in mind – don't go near downed powerlines and be careful of areas where there's a lot of debris or downed trees because it could conceal an energised powerline."

HOW Many People Use Your Library?

I had a conversation with a friend recently and I asked him to guess how many people he thought visited the Crookwell or Gunning Library during 2007/2008 and how many items each library had lent out for the year.

Let's just say he was very surprised to discover that Crookwell Library recorded 28,264 visits last year and that the library lend out 44,579 items, while Gunning Library had 10,340 visitors, and lent out 9495 items.

Patrons come to Upper Lachlan Shire Libraries for a number of reasons including to use the Internet, type up a letter or resume, borrow a book/DVD/magazine etc, attend StoryTime, listen to a guest speaker and enjoy lunch, study, read the newspaper or even listen to a CD.

Statistics play an important role in the life of any library. We are required by the State Library of NSW to report on various aspects of our service using a number of statistics collected throughout the year.

The statistics of the Southern Tablelands Regional Library (STRL) for 2007/2008 were very impressive. The following are the collective statistics for Crookwell, Goulburn, Gunning, Murrumbateman and Yass Libraries.

In 2007/2008 our 17,896 members made 333,721 loans, a total of 213,684 people visited the Shire's Libraries and 21,919 hours of Internet usage was undertaken.

CWA Day Branch 'Pres' scoopes pool

Crookwell Day Branch President of the CWA, Mrs Margaret Williams, scooped the pool in the Australian - Beanies for Cancer Victims -Competition.

Mrs Williams took first in the 'Australiana' section, first and second in 'Most Outrageous' category and first in 'Most Entries by One Person' (414).

Margaret combined with other Crookwell ladies to submit a total of 414 beanies, the most by any NSW CWA branch. For her efforts Margaret was awarded 80 rolls of wool.

Over all CWA ladies across the State knitted 800 beanies for cancer victims. These beanies are sent to hospitals that treat cancer patients with Chemotherapy.

The Internet usage at STRL is equivalent to 913 days (24hours/day).

Gunning Library is open Tuesday and Wednesday 2pm - 5pm, Thursday 1.30pm - 5pm, Friday 10am - 5.30pm.





I am sure this new team will work well together as did the last council for the best interest of the community as a whole. I would also like to thank Bill Martin, Charlie Prell and John Coombs for the contribution they made as inaugural councillors of the Upper Lachlan Shire.

Testing times

The problems facing the world's financial markets will undoubtedly impact on us all. Fortunately, our council's investments have had only minimal exposure to the current crisis, unlike some other councils as reported in the media.

Fortunately this Council is in good financial health as its latest audit

attests. This is due in large part to the hard work of the Council's Director of Finance and Administration, Andrew Croke; Manager of Finance, Bruce Johnson, and their team as well as the hard work of the previous Council.

One of the more pleasing aspects of the audit report regards the percentage of rates in arrears, which is 2.67 percent, down from last year's excellent result of 3.44 percent. The Department of Local Government defines as acceptable for rural communities to have an arrears rate of between 8 to 9 percent. In my opinion, this not only demonstrates that Council's staff

are doing a good job, but more importantly that the rate-payers of this Shire, during what have been difficult times, realise that the timely payment of rates is essential for the Council to deliver quality services.

I would like to point readers of the Voice to page 4 for a complete outline of the Council's latest audit completed by the Morse group, which was released on October 3, 2008.

Audit shows Shire financially

THE audit of Upper Lachlan Shire Council's 2007/2008 Financial Reports was completed by Morse Group Chartered Accountants in late August 2008 with the independent auditor's report presented to Council at it's meeting held October 16, in accordance with all Local Government Acts, codes, guidelines and Australian Accounting Standards.

The result of Upper Lachlan Shire Council's operations for the year ended 30 June 2008 is summarised as follows:

Net Operating Result for 2007/2008 from all Council Activities totals a \$6.447 million surplus while the Net Operating Result for the year before capital grants and contributions totals a \$38,000 deficit. Council had originally budgeted for a balanced operational budget.

The Financial Reports stated that Council's Cash and Investments held at June 30, 2008 totalled \$8.957 million. A breakdown of these amounts shows total external cash restrictions, i.e. restrictions for water

supply, sewerage, Section 94 developer contributions, unspent grants and domestic waste, of \$5.013 million. While internal cash restrictions total \$3.702 million, i.e. employee leave entitlements, plant replacement, uncompleted works, gravel pit and rubbish tip remediation, building and infrastructure reserves etc. There remains \$243,000 unrestricted cash, which is an increase of \$112,000 from 2007.

Financial measures

Financial Reports include performance measures. In the present financial climate one of the more important financial measures is the Council's ability to service debt. The audit demonstrates Council's 'Debt Service Ratio' is at 3.00 percent (three percent) and 'Rates and Charges Outstanding' percentage is now only 2.67 percent, both are excellent results.

Another important measurement is a healthy unrestricted current ratio of assets to liabilities and positive working funds balance. These indicators indicate the financial health of the Council. Auditors found Upper Lachlan Shire Council is in a sound financial position to meet all provisions and liabilities into the future. This is demonstrated by Council's Unrestricted Current Ratio of assets to liabilities is 3.46:1. This compares favourably with other well performed NSW Council's and shows the adequacy of Council's working funds to meet all liabilities and other restrictions. Upper Lachlan Shire Council's working funds result (net current asset surplus) totals \$834,000.

It is pleasing to note that Council's operating result was very close to the original budget set in Councils Management Plan. It is imperative that Council continue to adhere to the budget and responsibility administer public funds to the benefit of the entire Shire community.

Director of Works update

ONE of the most important functions of any Council concerns the maintenance and construction of the Shire's road network.

With this in mind the Voice will endeavour to keep its readers informed on the road works that have recently been completed, those in progress as well as those planned in the near future.

The following information was presented by the Director of Works, Mr Alan Lawrance to Councillors at the Council meeting held on October 16 in Gunning.

Works in Progress

Director Lawrance informed Councillors that he is presently in the process of seeking a 'Road Maintenance Council Control' (RMCC) for routine maintenance works for State Road 54 (Crookwell to Goulburn). Work to be contracted out includes edge break repairs, vegetation removal, drain clearing and the preparation of a heavy patching program

Other work

Also in process is work on Main Road 248 West (Crookwell to Boorowa). Crews have recently completed the gravel pavement of 3.8 kilometres between "Woodford" and "Windermere". This section of road is now under traffic. Subject to favourable weather conditions this section is scheduled for bitumen sealing in late October. The remaining section of 2.2 kilometres, ending at Old Man Gunyah Creek on the shire boundary, is scheduled for commencement in late October.

The culvert sections for the extension of the large reinforced concrete box culvert near the Rugby-Bevendale Road are due for delivery on October 9, with installation scheduled to commence on October 20, 2008.

Other road works include: patching repairs scheduled for October 7 on Main Road 241 East (Gundaroo Road), with grading maintenance carried out in September on Main Road 241 West (Dalton to Rugby). Also receiving attention is Main

Road 256 (Goulburn – Taralga – Oberon). This section of road will see restoration works at 'Pinches Pit' near the Abercrombie River, shoulder grading from Snake Gully Road to Abercrombie River, edge break repairs, line marking near Parsons Lane and vegetation/line of sight clearing.

Crews will be completing line marking of various sections of Main Road 52 (Crookwell – Gunning) as well as vegetation clearing south of Grabben Gullen.

Work on Bannaby Road is approximately one month behind schedule due to the demands of two large roads construction projects being undertaken at the same time, several vacancies in the Works Division and wet weather.

However, road reconstruction works is taking place between Ada Vale Road and the eastern end of the project. Two construction crews are onsite carrying out earthworks, drainage works, topsoiling, spreading of mulch, gravelling and pavement compaction.

To offset the delay two crews onsite will be working one extra hour per day for the next eight weeks and it is anticipated that the works will be completed in December 2008 as originally programmed.

Repairs to Taralga Memorial Hall

As well as road works Council crews are presently repairing sections of the roof over the two stairwells. Ceiling repairs will be deferred until significant rainfall has occurred and tested the repairs already completed.

Upcoming works

Maintenance schedules include the grading of the gravel sections of MR 54, Reids Flat Road, Greenmantle Road, Bigga Road area, the Peelwood Road as well as its side roads. Grading is also being planned for Golspie Road, Levels Road, Bolong Road areas and Plews Lane driveway crossing. The grading on Collector Road is in preparation for bitumen sealing in the week commencing October 20.

Tree removal work is being planned in Biala St. Gunning (due to sewer penetration). With the coming of spring time growth, grass slashing will take place around various villages.

Works Completed

Recent works completed include the upgrading of the pedestrian refuge at Lin Cooper Fields, Crookwell, as well as the removal of deadwood from trees in Barbour Park, Gunning. Line marking has taken place on various regional roads, while grading maintenance has taken place on Golspie, Grabine, Wombeyan Caves, Cooks Hill, Elms, Berrabanglo, Hillgrove, Rock Lodge and Ironmine Roads.

Crews have completed routine grass slashing, parks maintenance and waste collections as well as Gunning showground hall repairs.

Reconstruction of Robertson St driveway into council offices at Crookwell has also been completed.

Change

Those using the Collector Tip should be aware that there has been a change to the opening hours for that tip. Opening times are now Sundays only from 9am to 4pm.

Private Works

Under certain circumstances Council crews are requested to quote for private works. The benefit to Council in doing such work is the extra revenue for the Council that such works provide, the public good-will and the importance of full utilisation of Council equipment and work crews.

At present private works reconstruction is taking place on Bannaby Road for Transgrid. These works are worth \$2.90M + GST and are 60 percent completed.

Council road marking equipment was hired to CATCON for Lerida Road North for two weeks and Council has supplied recycled road pavement material to CATCON for Lerida Road North.

Road safety for learner drivers

Free Road Safety Workshop for Parents, Students and Supervising Drivers

A FREE two hour workshop for parents and supervising drivers is being presented by the Upper Lachlan Shire Council Road Safety Officer, Mark Foran at the Crookwell Rural Fire Service Training Facility on Tuesday October 28, 2008. Current young drivers and students who intend to apply for the learners permits are also welcome to attend. The course, 'Helping Learner Drivers Become Safer Drivers', has been

developed by the RTA and offers hands on advice on how to provide the most effective driving practice for learner drivers.

"The Graduated licensing scheme means that there is a requirement of one complete year on L plates with 120 hours minimum supervised driving, including 20 mandatory hours of night time driving. A more rigorous driving test is also in place, focusing on hazard perception and driver reaction,"

Mr Foran said.

Helping learner drivers

The course covers topics such as: how to use the learner driver log book, how to plan supervised on road driving instruction sessions, how to deal with difficult situations as they arise during driving practice, the importance of giving learner drivers constructive feedback.

Mr Foran continued, "Course participants will have the opportunity to win a free driving session from professional driving instructor Dan Wray. Each participant will also be issued with course material folders and a light supper will be served, all free of charge."

The graduated licensing scheme for learner drivers is all about reducing the crash rate for young drivers. Control Serrated Tussock before seeding

SERRATED Tussock remains the number one noxious weed affecting properties within Upper Lachlan Shire according to Council's Noxious Weeds Manager, Paul Brown. All landholders have a legal responsibility to control serrated tussock infestations on land that they are responsible for. It is stressed that to be successful with control programs all landowners need to survey their properties for the presence of serrated tussock plants and take appropriate control action before the plants produce seed during late November.

Paul stressed that on a high percentage of properties within Upper Lachlan controlling serrated tussock can be achieved by simply patrolling their paddocks on a regular basis and digging out or spot spraying invading scattered plants. One of the major restraints in controlling serrated tussock remains the accurate identification of plants. It is particularly important that all landholders in our area have the ability and skills to identify plants and carry out effective control programs. Landholders requiring assistance in identification or implementing control programs can obtained information by contacting Council's Weed Officers.

Paul also stressed that there is a significant risk that new weeds have been introduced into the region with the large amounts of fodder that have been acquired over recent years. It is extremely important that any new weed incursions are controlled before establishment. Again all landholders within Upper Lachlan Shire should patrol

their properties now and if any unusual vegetation is located they should contact Council's Noxious Weed Section for assistance in the accurate identification of weeds.

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
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Council demands State acknowledgment

IT IS the responsibility of every council to have developmental control measures in place as points of reference for those wishing to initiate projects of significance within its boundary.

With this in mind, on September 22, 2005 the Upper Lachlan Shire Council, enacted a Development Control Plan (DCP) in regard to the contentious development of wind farms.

The essential points of this Council's control measures for this type of development includes: the distance such towers should be from non-participating landowners houses, (two kilometres from such structures) as well as addressing such issues as the protection of biodiversity, aboriginal archaeology, communication towers, impacts land values, the cumulative impact of such developments, aviation hazards, as well as other concerns. While the Council recognizes that the NSW Department of Planning is the regulator of such developments it is this Council's opinion that the State should take into consideration this Council's DCP, which the Council believes best reflect the issues of importance to its residents.

With this in mind the Upper Lachlan Shire Council opposed, at its meeting held on September 25, the 84 tower Gullen Range Wind Farm Development, located 23 km to the west of Goulburn and wholly inside the Upper Lachlan Shire.

Mayor of the Upper Lachlan Shire, Cr John Shaw notes that it is a Council's legal responsibility to attempt the enforcement of its developmental control measures.

"I am very concerned that this development falls short of this Council's DCP, especially in regard to the number of towers that are closer to non-participating residents houses (two kilometres) than is clearly stated in our control measures.

Also of concern is the potential impact this project might have in regard to the use of two landing fields located near the project," Mayor Shaw said.

In regard to this last issue the Council demands that the proponent offers the same considerations that were given to the recently approved Cullerin Wind Farm, that being, that the proponent demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Director General that local aircraft movement and use of the airstrip and aerodromes in question will not be adversely affected by the project.

Continuing, Mayor Shaw said, "There are 32 homes of non-participating parties located within 1.5 kilometres of the towers of this wind farm. This is clearly in breach of the Council's requirement that towers be at least two kilometers away from the houses of those not hosting such developments.

"This is not a matter of being opposed to wind farm developments but an objection to the manner in which this is being decided. We don't believe the proponents of this development are taking Council's DCP into consideration," the Mayor said.



WHEVER we live, we share our environment with native animals which have had to adapt to our cities, towns, roads and farms. WIRES (NSW Wildlife Information, Rescue & Education Service) was the first fulltime network established to assist native animals. It is an independent, non-profit organisation operating under licence from NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service, with 30 branches throughout NSW and approximately 2,200 volunteers rescuing sick and injured wildlife.

Southern Tablelands Branch covers most of Upper Lachlan and Goulburn Mulwaree LGA's, and is operated by a dedicated group of volunteers. If you find a native animal in distress, telephone 02 4822

3888. You will be advised what to do until one of our trained volunteers can attend. TAWNIES IN TROUBLE

ThreeTawny Frogmouths were rescued in the Crookwell area one week recently. One had flown into a domestic wind turbine, shattering a wing, and sadly had to be euthanased. Another had a broken leg from a vehicle collision which was splinted by a vet and subsequently healed, enabling Tawny to be successfully released. The third had become entangled in a barbed wire fence, tearing a hole in one wing. After vet treatment and some time in care the wing healed, and this Tawny also was able to be returned to the

AN INTERESTING TAWNY FACT

Tawnys frequently damage their tongues bashing their catch on a branch to kill it. Sometimes the tongue gets pushed back and creased as the catch is swallowed. The tongue will eventually drop off at the crease with no discomfort to the bird. A new section of tongue will gradually grow, in the same way as the re-growth of the tail of a lizard.

Don't be a tosser

UPPER Lachlan Shire Council in association with the South East Resource Recovery Regional Organisation of Councils (SERRROC) launches local litter campaign.

"Litter is one of the most visible and persistent environmental issues our council faces. It can pollute our streets, parks and public spaces and damages our environment. It also affects our area's image and tourism income," the Mayor of Upper Lachlan Shire Council, Cr John Shaw said.

Upper Lachlan Shire Council is launching its Don't be a Tosser - Bin Your Butts local education campaign, with a focus on cigarette butt littering in public places.

Cr Shaw says the campaign will be targeting cigarette butt littering - which accounts for almost half of all litter items. There are seven billion cigarette butts thrown away each year in Australia. This is a huge threat to our waterways, aquatic life and the cleanliness of our local streets.

The campaign will include: posters, street banners, and stickers and drink coasters placed in local hotels and clubs; personal ashtrays handed out to residents and visitors; newspaper and advertisements.

The campaign aims to reduce cigarette butt litter by informing people about the harmful effects of littering, the social unacceptability of littering, and the fines that apply by law.

An average of six out of ten Australian smokers in outdoor settings litter their butts, and this is a particular problem outside hotels and office buildings.

The environmental impacts of cigarette butts include the release of toxic emissions into water and soil as they decompose. As well, butts are not 100% biodegradable the paper and tobacco are, but the filters can take up to 12 years to decompose.

"Cigarette tossers can be fined \$60 on the spot for littering stubbed out cigarette butts, and \$200 for lit cigarette butts," Cr Shaw said.

"People care about litter but often don't realise that they are part of the problem.

"Throughout the campaign, the council's enforcement officers will be out talking to the community about litter laws and spreading the litter prevention message. Enforcement officers can issue on the spot fines for littering ranging from \$60 to \$750," Cr Shaw said.

So the message is "Don't be a tosser – Bin your butts" - use bins, personal ashtrays or take your rubbish home and dispose of it thoughtfully.

Cr Shaw continued, "We want people to

think about what they are throwing away, and we welcome support for the campaign to help reduce littering in our community."

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
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Hammer falls - auction declared

Cullerin Range Wind Farm project update from Origin

Project Status

SINCE receiving development approval from the NSW Government in February 2007, the Cullerin Range Wind Farm project has progressed through to construction design and the preliminary construction phases.

Following approval of the Construction Environmental Management Plan by the NSW Planning Department on June 19, 2008, extensive geotechnical work was undertaken to design the road from Lerida Road North to the top of the ridge, as well as the roadworks between the 15 turbines.

The Upper Lachlan Shire Council was contracted to upgrade the Lerida Road North so that some bends were straightened and the road was levelled so that long low loaders could deliver the equipment to site. Currently Origin's contractors, Catcon, have 60 workers on site – including local labour. Where possible, equipment and supplies have been sourced locally for the supply of hardware, fencing, concrete works, signage and landscaping activities. The site offices and compound are situated on Lerida Road North near the intersection with the Hume Highway.

Hardstand areas - where equipment is placed ready to build the towers, nacelles and blades - have been established next to each tower position.

The 15 tower foundations have been dug to a depth of approximately 2m, reinforced steel has been placed at the bottom of each hole, some embeds (the tower bases that are eventually covered in reinforced concrete) have been placed in position, and are awaiting the concrete pour in the next few weeks.

A permanent Origin Site Manager has joined the team and from early September has been based on site full time.
