

He truely is a worthy candidate for this year's Citizen of the Year. Dr. Velu was also recognised for his contributions to the community with an OAM, Member of the Order of Australia.

Local charities to benefit from energy crew win

THE Crookwell Country Energy Field Service Centre (FSC) is celebrating multiple successes in a company wide competition, known as the FSC Cup Challenge, to measure and rank the performance of FSCs against a range of productivity, safety and customer service goals.

The Crookwell FSC topped the state in the medium division, beating 35 other Country Energy field teams across New South Wales which also have between eight and 16 employees. Regional general manager South Eastern Phillip Green, described the achievement as "outstanding", but explained that the ultimate winners were customers.

NEW OPENING HOURS ON TRIAL AT YOUR LIBRARY

IN an endeavour to provide the best service to patrons of our libraries, the Upper Lachlan Shire Library Service will trial revised opening hours for a six month period from 4th January to 30th June 2011.



ROYALTIES FOR REGIONS PROGRAM

COUNCIL received correspondence from the Mayor of Orange City, John Davis, requesting that Upper Lachlan Shire Council support the Royalties for Regions Program. The Royalties for Regions program is an initiative of the Association of Mining Related Councils to work with the NSW State Government to assist communities across the state to provide additional services and community infrastructure by returning 30 percent of all royalties received by the State Government back to Local Government.

The cooperative arrangements promoted by the Association of Mining Related Councils will assist local and regional government to establish long term funding programs that support the community. The royalty money is in addition to regular budget programs of Local Government and it will provide an estimated \$300million for regional commu-

STREET FURNITURE

The Crookwell Lions Club made a request to place a bench seat dedicated to Dr Thangavelu in front of the Doctor's surgery in Goulburn Street, Crookwell.

The bench seat will be the second to be installed in the main street, with the first seat installed in front of the Uniting Church and dedicated to the late Bob Spackman.

WOMEN'S DAY GRANT 2011

The Hon Jodi McKay MP, Minister for Women wrote to Council on 14 December 2010 advising that Council has been successful in the NSW Government's 2011 International Women's Day (IWD) grants program.

The NSW Government will provide Council with a \$1,000.00 grant to help celebrate the centenary year of International Women's Day.

On a rotational basis, it is the Gunning areas turn to celebrate International Women's Day. Therefore Council, in collaboration with the Gunning community, will stage the following three events: A luncheon (with cooking and serving undertaken by volunteer males) with a guest speaker (possibly the author of a book on the history of local midwifery), a photographic exhibition with portraits of local women (past and present), talking heads - a series of play-lets with a theme relating to and featuring women in the main roles.

CULTURAL ACCORD

The Local Government and Shires Associations (LGSA) have advised the signing of a three year partnership agreement, to work on arts and cultural development. Signed on November 30, 2010 by the LGSA Presidents and Virginia Judge MP, NSW Minister for Fair Trading and Minister for the Arts, a fourth Cultural Accord has been sought by the Associations prior to the third accords expiration in 2008.

The Fourth Cultural Accord will operate for a period of three years, commencing on January 1, 2011 and concluding on December 31, 2013. This accord will further develop the working partnership between NSW State and Local Government.

Arts NSW and the Local Government

Associations of NSW and Shires Associations of NSW have committed to working together to progress the Accord. Arts NSW and the LGSA will also collaborate with peak arts bodies and other government and non-government agencies when appropriate.

GOVERNMENT COMMUNITY BUILDING PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

Council received email correspondence from Kristina Keneally MP, the NSW Premier on December 17, 2010 announcing that funding will be provided to Upper Lachlan Shire Council under the NSW Government's Community Building Partnership program within the Burrinjuck and Goulburn electorate.

The Premier offered her congratulations on Council's successful application of \$20,000 for the "Barbour Park Recreation Area Refurbishment Project" in Gunning and \$10,000 for the "Painting Taralga War Memorial Hall (Internal and External)" project.

The Council would like to thank Katrina Hodgkinson, the Member for Burrinjuck and Pru Goward, the Member for Goulburn for their assistance in gaining these grants.

Rate Peg Determination for 2011/2012

THE maximum ordinary (general) rate peg increase for NSW local government for 2011/2012 has been set at 2.80 percent by the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART).

The 2.80 percent increase is applicable to the total revenue received by Council from ordinary (general) rate income and is not a uniform increase on every individual rate assessment. The rate pegging limit does not apply to other Council rates and charges for services such as water, sewer, domestic waste, rural waste, etc.

This rate peg decision is the first to be made under the new policy arrangements which were announced by the Premier on June 4, 2010. The new arrangements require IPART to determine the maximum allowable increase in the general income of local governments ('rate peg') commencing with the 2011/12 income year.

The Local Government Cost Index measures movements in prices of a representative 'basket' of inputs that are used to deliver local government services. The methodology used by IPART for the Local Government Cost Index is similar to the one used by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) for the Consumer Price Index (CPI).

This new system does provide more transparency and accountability but despite this, the 2.8% rate cap still falls well short of the real cost increases facing Councils, making it difficult for Councils to meet the grow-

NSW Councils already have to deal with an inadequate share of taxation and continue to pay over \$440 million every year for costs shifted onto us by other levels of government. The annual cosat shifting from the NSW State Government to the Upper Lachlan Shire Council is equivalent to 4.5 percent of total income or in dollar terms is an annual operating cost to Council of \$845,000.

New Land Values for 2011/2012 Rates

The NSW Valuer General (through the and Property Management Authority) has conducted a General Revaluation of land values applicable to each rateable assessment of land within the Upper Lachlan Shire Council. The new land values will be used for the calculation of rates from 2011/2012. Ratepayers should shortly be receiving a formal Notice of Valuation from the Valuer General advising them of their new land value. The land values used to calculate the current 2010/2011 rates can be found by referring to 2010/2011 rate notice. The land value

does not generally reflect the full sale price that could be obtained for the property but is based on the price of land sold in the area and any increases or decreases in property values should be reflected in the new land values.

The Valuer General advises landowners who are not satisfied with the land value recorded on their Notice of Valuation that they have 60 days to lodge an objection to have the land value reviewed. The Valuer General has the discretion to accept objections beyond the 60 day time frame. If you want to lodge an out of date objection you must provide detailed reasons why the objection is late. The Valuer General will then determine whether to accept the objection. Objections must be made using the approved valuation objection form or by using our online objection facility at www.lpma.nsw.gov.au/valuation.

While changes in land values on individual assessments can impact on individual ratepayers, the total rate income Council is able to collect is determined by the rate pegging increase and not by the valuation of land.

NEW DIRECTOR OF ENVIRONMENT AND PLANNING

THE recently appointed Director of Environment and Planning, Ms. Tina Dodson, brings 20 years of local government experience predominately within the environmental services area. This has provided the new Director with extensive experience in the planning, health and environmental processes relating to both the rural and urban Council environment.

Ms. Dodson noted that within her career in Local Government the one thing that is guaranteed is the certainty of change.

An example of change is the Upper Lachlan Local Environmental Plan of 2010, and the Upper Lachlan Development Control Plan 2010 which were gazetted in July 2010.

"The LEP and the respective Development Control Plans that accompany it will provide a clear direction and guide future change in the area for the next 15 to 20 years," the Director said.

"What should be appreciated is that this plan took over five of years to bring to this point. And as the Shire changes so too could the makeup of future LEPs. This will require the development of close working relationship with the Shire's Councillors, its staff but most of all its citizens. That is why Local Government is such an interesting and challenging occupation," Ms. Dodson concluded.

BACKGROUND

Ms. Dodson has held such senior management positions as the Manager of Environmental Services and Director of Environmental Services with Mulwaree Shire Council, Manager Development Control with Goulburn Mulwaree Council and Manager Environment and Planning with Upper Lachlan Shire Council.

the Noxious Weeds Act 1993. A copy of this Issues Paper was provided to Councillors at the December 2010 Council Meeting.

The Noxious Weeds Act sets out the regulatory framework for the control of noxious weeds in NSW. A review of the Act is conducted every five years to determine whether the objectives of the Act remain

ON the week commencing December 13, 2010 Industry and Investment NSW released a Statutory Review Issues Paper as part of a process of reviewing

FEASIBILITY REVIEW FOR POTENTIAL GAS-FIRED POWER STATION AT BIG HILL

ORIGIN has commenced a feasibility review of a potential gasfired power station development neering studies as part of the feanear Big Hill which, if constructed, would play a significant role in helping to meet growing and future demand for electricity in NSW.

The assessment of the 'Kerrawary Power Station' development is aligned with Origin's pursuit of a portfolio of gas and renewable energy opportunities in Australia and abroad. Origin is currently assessing the development of a 1,000 MW gas-fired power station, which may be constructed in two stages. The 20 hectare Kerrawary site is on approximately 900 hectares of land which has an extensive buffer zone around it.

Origin has commenced community engagement in the local area as well as a series of environmental, sociological and engisibility review for the project.

Origin's Community Relations Advisor, Kathy Howard said that Origin was committed to respecting the rights and interests of the communities in which it operates.

"We have been engaging with the community to understand the range of local views and provide information in relation to the potential development. This work will continue as we progress studies and review the potential of the project," Ms Howard said.

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


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
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STORM DAMAGE REPORT

DECEMBER rains have seen significant damage to the Shire's bridges and roads.

In a report to Council, at the January 20, 2011 meeting, The Manager of Works Peter Mowle, reported that the Works Department had inspected most of the Shire's 260 local roads, of which 193 have been damaged by

the flooding on December 9, 2010.

Mr. Mowle reported to Council that the RTA had approved \$832,000 million with total damage estimates to be in the area of \$6 million.

Of that \$6 million \$5 million are earmarked for roads, three quarters of million dollars for bridge repair and one quarter of a million dollars are estimated for the repair of the Carrington Street large sewer main (this pipe line caters to the needs of three quarters of Crookwell residents).

Inspections have identified that of the Shire's 73 bridges, 12 had been damaged. The damaged bridges included are; the Brooklands footbridge in Crookwell, the Bell Street, the Peelwood, the Mulgowrie, the McDonald Street, Julong, Woodville, Meadow Creek and the Coates Creek bridges.

Of the 193 damaged roads the highest priority are those with damages in excess of \$100,000. This level of damage was incurred to the following roads: Bridge Creek, Foggs Crossing, Kangaloolah, Mulgowrie, Rhyanna, Lost River, Hollywood, Woodhouselee, Gunning, Bevendale, Jerrara, Mullengrove, Glen Erin, Reids Flat and Rye Park Roads. Minor roads damaged by the rains and in the general location of the major roadways will also receive repairs.

Depending on weather conditions and other

unexpected circumstances, road damage is to be completed first and will take approximately 12 months using both Council employees and contractors. Repair to the 12 damaged bridges is yet to be determined. Scheduling of these repairs will be determined in consultation with the Council, RTA and the Public Works Department (PWD).

Worst impacted areas during the December 9 rains included the Heffernan's Creek area at Pomeroy, areas west of Bigga and the Mulgowrie Creek. Residences in these areas are requested to report any rainfall data they may have collected. Please forward that information to Carrie Gibson at the Council's Works Department on 4830 1053. Council will continue to update residents on road closures and repairs scheduling via its web site located at www.upperlachlan.locale.nsw.gov.au

"Four great days cycling gave us many






