

Over \$220,000 distributed from Taralga Wind Farm Community Funds

Nine projects in the Taralga area will benefit from a combined \$222,283 in funding from the Taralga Wind Farm Community Fund for 2023/2024.

The grants were assessed by the Taralga Wind Farm Community Fund S355 Committee and were approved at the June 2023 Ordinary Meeting of Council.

Taralga Wind Farm owner and operator Pacific Blue supports the Fund with an annual financial contribution, as part of its ongoing commitment to local communities.

The grants will help the projects listed below.

said the Fund provides grants to projects or initiatives that benefit the community within 20km of the wind farm.

Tourism and Events Update

Council received and noted the Economic Development and Tourism report.

Council approved the 2022/2023 transfer of funds from the Tourism Services internal restricted cash reserve fund totalling \$69,803 for the expense of the Reconnecting Regional NSW events and Crookwell Country Weekend event.

Council approved the transfer of funds from unrestricted cash reserves totalling \$63,273 for the expense of the Reconnecting Regional NSW events and Crookwell Country Weekend event.

Procurement of one new light vehicle

Council resolved to increase the 2023/24 plant replacement program budget by \$8,000 (excl. GST) to enable the purchase of a replacement vehicle for the new CEO, the \$8,000 to be funded from unrestricted cash reserves.

106-108 Goulburn Street Crookwell – Lot DP314755

Council resolved to consider the sale of the former Westpac Bank House building at 106-108 Goulburn Street Crookwell, Lot 1 DP 314755. Council will seek an EOI for the former Westpac Bank House for a market appraisal and best use option by an agent, including an agent with Commercial property experience.

Works in Progress - Construction and Maintenance - July 2023

This report provides Council with details regarding major construction works in progress or completed and current maintenance work in progress or recently completed in 2022/23.

Current Works

Grabine Road Reconstruction (Growing Local Economies Program)

The construction of large box culverts at Sandy Creek crossing on Grabine Road were completed in early April 2023. Installation of guardrail took place in May 2023 and line marking was completed in June 2023. This project is complete.

Jerrawa Road – Pavement Rehabilitation

Pavement Rehabilitation Works started in early February 2023 on the initial 1.5km of Jerrawa Road leaving Dalton. Roadside clearing, culvert replacement and upgrade and earthworks are complete. Sealing was completed in May 2023. Line marking completed. This project is complete pending remedial repair of seal in warmer weather.

Saxby and Carrington Street Footpath Works

Footpath works on Saxby Street, Gunning were completed in May 2023. Carrington Street, Crookwell footpath works are ongoing. The first section from Brooklands Street through Apex Park and along Northcott Street is now complete. The second section is in progress to connect to the service station along Carrington Street, which is scheduled to be completed by July 2023. A separate section of footpath from JD's Rural store in Goulburn Street, Crookwell to the existing pedestrian footbridge along Carrington Street was completed in June 2023.

Laggan Road MR248E Rehabilitation (Regional Roads Repair Program)

Upgrade works on Laggan Road (MR248) in Crookwell between Clifton Street and Woodward Lane addressing pavement and stormwater issues. Works commenced late March 2023 with storm water pipes installed/renewed, kerb and gutter installed and part of road upgrade completed. Completion of works is underway and expected to be complete by end July 2023.

Golspie Road – Pavement Rehabilitation

Pavement Rehabilitation Works started in late April 2023 on a 1.5km section of Golspie Road from Woolshed Creek to Martyn Street Taralga. The scope of works also includes drainage improvements, driveway pipes, gravel overlay and sealing. This project is now complete.

Pedestrian School Zone Safety Program

Stage 1 (Raised pedestrian crossings) – All works have been completed.

Stage 2 (Line Marking and Signage) – All works have been completed.

Goulburn Road (MR54) – RMCC (State Road Funding)

Line-marking of the network was completed during May 2023. Emergency heavy patch repairs at Elmgrove Road were completed in June 2023 and awaiting line-marking. Batter slips North of Tuena are in design and costing phase. Routine maintenance is ongoing.

Timber Bridge Replacements

Bridge components for all three outstanding timber bridge replacements have been delivered and construction has commenced at all three sites. Construction on Cooksvale Road, over Peelwood River is complete. The existing structure will be removed when all three bridges have been completed.

Construction on Bridge over Burra Burra Creek on Blue Hills Road is complete with minor pavement realignment required.

Construction on Julong Road over the Crookwell River has been placed on hold following discovery of materially adverse site conditions. Additional geotechnical investigations and design work is underway.

Natural Disaster Restoration Works Program

Council crews are continually attending to unsealed roads and rehabilitation of large pavement failures of sealed section. Council has engaged contractors to both manage and undertake the storm damage restoration under the various Natural Disaster declarations.

Council has received approval for \$3.26M in funding to undertake Restoration Works so far for Natural Disaster with a further amount of approximately \$10M pending TfNSW approval.

Gravel Road Resheeting Program (Roads to Recovery)

Council's gravel resheeting program for the 2022/23 financial year comprised of \$500k to be spent on Redground Road, Redground Heights Road, Pejar Road, Glenerin Road, and Rugby Road. These works have been completed.

Upcoming Works

Goulburn Road (MR54) – RMCC (State Road Funding)

Routine maintenance continues into the 2023/24 financial year with a similar operating budget under the Road Maintenance Council Contract (RMCC) with TfNSW. Heavy patching and bitumen sealing of a further seven segments are in planning and costing phase.

Seg330 (Rylstone Road) safety upgrade is in design stage and expected to be delivered this financial year.

Peelwood Road Reconstruction

(Heavy Vehicle Safety and Production Program/Fixing Local Roads 6)

Construction commenced on Peelwood Road in October 2022. Major drainage works have taken place however works were stopped due to weather conditions with an extension of time for funding approved until December 2023. Works should recommence in September 2023.

Wheeo Road Reconstruction (Heavy Vehicle Safety and Production Program//Fixing Local Roads 6)

Construction commenced on Wheeo Road in October 2022. Major drainage works have taken place however, works were stopped due to weather conditions with an extension of time for funding approved until December 2023. Works recommenced in late March 2023 with

the first 1km section completed in late April 2023.

Further funding (\$797k) has been secured under Fixing Country Roads Rd6 to complete road upgrades to Hawthornes Tree Road as per original design. This work is planned for late 2023.

Breadalbane Road Reconstruction (Fixing Local Roads 4)

Surveyors have been engaged with the design due to be completed by August 2023. Construction is scheduled to start September 2023 and completed by June 2024.

Wombeyan Caves Road MR258

Additional funding has been received from National Parks Wildlife Service to cover cost escalations due to putting the project on hold. Currently awaiting the contractor to provide a revised program to complete the original scope of works.

Council is carrying out additional geotech investigations on the two new slips that are anticipated to be covered under the Natural Disasters grant.

Tablelands Way (MR 256 – Taralga Road)

Council has received grant funding from the NSW State Government to upgrade four sections of Tablelands Way (also called Taralga Road or MR256) north of Taralga. These sections have been numbered in order of priority. Section 1 (the highest priority), is the replacement of an underperforming culvert/causeway arrangement over Burra Burra Creek with a single span bridge. Sections 2-4 are road upgrades with several curve realignments, widening and furnishing.

Detail design works on the Tablelands Way sections are complete other than the gabion retaining walls. Council is in discussion with the designer to undertake the design works for the gabion walls.

Detailed design of the bridge over Burra Burra Creek at Curraweela Section is complete. Construction tenders closed on 16 March 2023. Council declined to accept all tenders received due to the lack of any commercially advantageous submissions. Direct commercial negotiations are currently underway with the intent to enter a contract with one supplier for construction of a new bridge over Curraweela Creek as their alternative submissions are within budget and meets Council's requirements.

Ongoing Works

Resealing Program (Fixing Local Roads Round 2)

Council received \$4.3M in grant funding to be spent over the 2021/22 and 2022/23 financial years. Reseals and reseal preparation works including heavy patching have been completed on Peelwood, Fullerton, Jerrawa, Collector, Roslyn and Bigga Roads. Cullerin Road is yet to commence. Work is scheduled to be completed by December 2023, weather dependant.

Regional and Local Resealing programs to be delivered as normal.

Flood Warning Systems

The scope of works include the upgrade of rain gauges to automated systems in Crookwell, Taralga, Collector and Gunning and installation of a new water level gauge at Gunning. The automated rain gauges and water level gauge will include alert facilities to SES and Council.

The design stage of the project has been completed. Council has applied for a grant under the 2023-24 Floodplain Management Program to supply and install the infrastructure. The funding announcements is expected to be made by the State Department in November 2023.

Regional and Local Roads Repair Program (RLRRP)

Council has received funding through the Fixing Local Roads Pothole Repair Program and Regional and Local Roads Repair Program (RLRRP). This critical funding injection will ensure completion of road repairs, priority corrective maintenance works and repair of potholes on our local and regional road network.

Individual roads are still to be nominated and agreed with the funding agencies. In accordance with the grant deeds, works must be completed by 1 January 2024 and 29 February 2024 respectively.

Routine Maintenance - Works in

Progress/Completed Recently

Council will continue to prioritize road maintenance based on bus routes, road hierarchy, road damage and road usage. This will result in some roads being maintained as a higher priority and to a higher standard, while others will fall into lower priority category and maintained to a lower standard until the situation returns to normal. The continued wet weather over the past two years has resulted in Council being behind on its scheduled maintenance grading requirements as some roads are requiring additional maintenance.

Council's Infrastructure Department are not doing any private works or selling gravel from any of our pits at the moment due to the requirement to utilise all available time and resources to repair roads and maintain essential services for residents of the shire.

Crookwell Caravan Park Bookings now available online

Patrons of the Crookwell Caravan Park are now able to book their stay online.

Starting Thursday 29 June 2023, a new online bookings system has gone live, accessible from the Visit Upper Lachlan website.

Council Chief Executive Officer Alex Waldron said that the system will provide extra flexibility and access to the system that is already in place.

"With the new online bookings system, people are able to book online out of hours at a time that suits them," she said.

"Previously you could only book into the Crookwell Caravan Centre through the Visitor Information Centre, either on phone or face to face, during business hours. that way, but now visitors have the flexible option of booking out of hours."

A new electronic sign has also been installed at the Crookwell Caravan Park, to not only help visitors locate the centre but also to provide useful information. through the Crown Reserves Improvement Fund. This grant also included funding for movement of utilities, concreting foundations, new drains and power poles, fillings, landscaping, solar lights with CCTV, bin surrounds and holders and updating of power board.

the visibility of the centre and can rotate through various messages," Ms Waldron said.

Beloved and long-time member of staff Craig Smart has decided to enjoy retirement life, and was recently farewelled at a combined Retirement / Birthday morning tea.

Craig, a Design Engineer, has notched up 34 years of service with Crookwell Council and then Upper Lachlan Shire Council, with a further six years in local government with other Councils before that.

Director of Infrastructure Leon Kruger praised Craig for his friendly, unassuming demeanour and for his role in so much of the infrastructure that now exists in the Shire, including most of the sealed roads into Goulburn that were unsealed when he got here.

Other staff members and former staff members spoke of the impact Craig had, not just on Council but on the



trainees and junior staff he has mentored along the way, and he was thanked and wished best luck by CEO Alex Waldron and Mayor Pam Kensit for his commitment and contribution to Council.

Remembering former Council staff member and Councillor Don Southwell

Former senior staff member and twoterm Councillor of Crookwell Shire Council Donald John Southwell has passed away at the age of 89.

In addition to his dual roles with Council, Mr Southwell was heavily involved in Community groups and activities over many years and in 2018 was named the Upper Lachlan Citizen of the Year.

Mayor Pam Kensit described Mr Southwell as a dedicated and committed member of many organisations who had achieved great things for Crookwell and the Upper Lachlan Shire.

"This is a tragic loss, obviously for his family and friends but also for the broader community," Mayor Kensit said.

"It's never possible to put into words the impact of any person upon their passing, but Don Southwell was a particularly community-focused person and his accomplishments, efforts and example will be appreciated for many years to come."

Mr Southwell was born at Balgowlah on 27 November 1933. He was educated at Manly West Public School, Balgowlah Primary School and North Sydney Technical College before completing a Diploma in Civil Engineering. His first job was in the Division of Wood Technology of the Forestry Commission and his first job in local government was in 1953 as a Cadet Engineer at Warringah Shire Council.

He subsequently worked in local government at Councils in Namoi, Glen Innes, Bowral, Murrurundi and Nymboida before qualifying as a Town and Country Planner.

He then worked for the State Planning Authority at Grafton, Taree, Tweed and Moree, Campbelltown and Parramatta before returning to local Government and commencing at the Crookwell Shire Council as Deputy Engineer and Town Planner from 1987 until his retirement, aged 60, in 1993.

Miscellaneous town improvements including, among other things, Off Street • Parking areas, Town entrance structure, • relocation of Council Chambers and improvements to Amenities Block. Resigned 1993 aged 60.

The Southwell family moved to Crookwell in 1987. Although this decision was largely based on taking up employment, the decision was also intended as part of Mr Southwell's retirement planning, but if anything he only got busier.

Following his period as a staff member, Don was elected to Crookwell Council in September 1996 and served two terms until September 2004, immediately preceding the amalgamation as Upper Lachlan Shire Council.

He served one year as Deputy Mayor and was Council's delegate to Southern Tablelands Regional Library, Sydney Water Catchment Advisory Council, Crookwell Tourism Association and was a Grabine Lakeside Park Trustee.

In addition to his roles with Council, Mr Southwell took on extensive involvement in community organisations, including:

- Crookwell Rotary Club (member since 1962, twice president, Paul Harris award, Assistant District Governor, District committees
- The Crookwell Men's Shed (Secretary and Life member – helped design, construct and set up the constitution)

- CADS (numerous roles, including "Bishop" in first role and "Boozie, the town drunk in last role)
- Cancer Council (Team leader, Daffodil Day)
- Crookwell Community Singers
- Stephenson's Mill Management Committee (during restoration)
- Crookwell Bowling Club (treasurer up until amalgamation with Services Club)
- Census Collector (Area Manager)
- Crookwell High School (representative for special events and Examinations Supervisor)
- Society of Antique Modelers (active member and four-time Australian Champion of Champions).

During his early years of employment, he served for two terms of National Service as an Aircraftman (Recruit).

Mr Southwell married his wife Beryl on 17 August 1957 and they travelled from town to town during the course of his employment, along with their four children, Christine (born 1959), Fiona (1962), Jennifer (1965) and Wayne (1968).

He is predeceased by Beryl who passed away on 21 May 2020.

Mr Southwell was laid to rest at Crookwell Lawn Cemetery following a service at the Wesley Uniting Church in Crookwell.

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Introduction of new Liquid Trade Waste Policy

The State Government has implemented legislation to ensure organisations that dispose of liquid waste conduct this appropriately, protecting the environment and public health.

In conjunction with New South Wales Department of Planning, Industry & Environment's best practice guidelines, Council are implementing a Liquid Trade Waste Policy, which will advise business and industry of their obligations.

Upper Lachlan Shire Council, at its meeting on Thursday 18 May 2023 resolved to place the Draft Liquid Trade Waste Policy on exhibition.

Submissions will be sought until Wednesday 9 August 2023, in which time, will return to Council for final consideration and adoption.

Liquid trade waste means all liquid waste, other than sewage of a domestic nature, that is discharged into Council's sewage system from:

- Business/commercial premises eg. Hairdresser, florist, hotel, café, butcher, service station
- Community/public premises eg.



School, hospital, nursing home Industrial/Factory

 Any commercial activities carried out at a residential premises

By controlling liquid trade waste discharges, Council can:

- Reduce problem substances from reaching treatment plants
 Improve wastewater quality
 Preventing harmful substances from damaging Council's sewerage system
- Reduce sewer overflows and blockages by controlling grease discharges
- Create a safer workplace for staff

Vehicle weighing service coming to Crookwell in August

Upper Lachlan Shire Council will be hosting a caravan / trailer / horse float weighing service conducted by the Sutton Road Training Centre on 26 August 2023.

The service is aimed at increasing road safety and, in particular, increasing the knowledge of drivers towing heavy loads behind their vehicles and who may not be aware of the limitations, legalities and dangers of the activity.

Drivers have the opportunity to have their vehicle and caravan / trailer / horse float combination weighed with a report provided. Weight limitations and correct loading techniques are explained during the process.

The weighing service will be performed at the Crookwell Showground. The cost is \$200 per vehicle combination, payable on the day by cash or by eftpos.
